## Just Do It: Tips for Classroom Teachers

- \* **Promote Cooperation and Caring:** Reinforce acts of kindness and communicate values of tolerance, respect and responsibility
- \* **Hold Classroom Meetings:** Discussing the issue with students promotes empathy
- \* Role-Play Social Situations: Role-play a bully-victim scenario and discuss
- \* Present Lessons With a Bullying Theme: Read a book, design a survey or use art
- \* Supervise Areas Where Bullying is Likely: Be visible during less structured times
- \* Encourage Bystanders to Act: Share tips with your students. Tell a bully to stop, distract the bully by getting the focus on something else, reach out to the victim in friendship and inform a staff member.
- \* Catch the Bully Being Kind: Make a special effort to say something positive to a student who is prone to unkind behavior.
- \* Inform Other School Staff: Let other school personnel know, including special subject teachers and paraprofessionals to help monitor behavior
- \* **Support the Victim:** Take all reports seriously. Listen, provide reassurance and encouragement, inform student that school will do its best to ensure it does not happen again,
- \* Improve the Victim's Coping Skills: Help the victim be more assertive with the bully without being aggressive
- \* **Act Quickly:** Take immediate action and document interventions made. Inform the principal and parents. The longer the abuse goes on, the greater the impact on the student.
